**Gilbert Caldwell:**

(Gil was a classmate at Boston University School of Theology, who became a major civil rights leader in our country. He co-founded Black Methodists for Church Renewal and United Methodists of Color for an Inclusive Church. He is on the PFLAG National Board of Directors. I include more of his letter as I think everyone needs to hear his words relating what is happening now in relationship to with the civil rights struggles of the past.)

“The resolution on "Conflicting Mandates" addresses those who limit the meaning of Jesus by their interpretations of "Christian teaching". I have found a quotation from writer Barbara Ehrenreich helpful. She was interviewed in The New York Times Magazine of March 30th. The interviewer asks if she continues to be an atheist and Ehrenreich responds, "**My younger sister (and I) are hard-line atheists**". But, here is what she said about Jesus;

**"I've spent so many years talking about poverty and economic justice, I'm strongly tempted to get biblical. Jesus's teaching are so radical, they're just insanely generous and apocalyptic. Christians become more fascinated by the dead Jesus. They don't like the living Jesus".** (My underlining)

The Resolution on **"Conflicting Mandates"** is about much more than issues related to lgbtq persons, same sex marriage, and UM clergy who are in complete ministry to same sex couples. It is a reminder that now is the time for the United Methodist Church to acknowledge and atone for its history of **"discriminatory mandates of exclusion."**

We foolishly thought that we had learned that our Methodist language and legislation in the Book of Discipline in the past that was anti-women and anti-black violated the spirit of an inclusive Jesus. But if we had learned that lesson, we would not in 2014 dare to justify anti-gay language and legislation as being reflective of "Christian teaching".
